- Your worldview is your underlying beliefs, both conscious and subconscious, that shape your attitudes, values, and expectations as you walk through life.
 - Who am I? Who or what dictates who I am? What does it mean to be human?
 - Where did I come from? Am I here by design? Am I accountable to anyone?
 - The worldview of naturalism holds that the only things that are real are what we can observe in the material world, with no possibility of a spirit realm or a God.
 - For the naturalist, the way that humans got to where we are today was by successfully advancing our own best interests at the expense of those who are weaker.
 - “Worthy are You, our Lord and our God, to receive glory and honor and power; for You created all things, and because of Your will they existed, and were created.” | Revelation 4:11
 - The Christian worldview requires us to submit everything we are and everything we do to God's will, for his purposes.
 - God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them. | Genesis 1:27
 - We were meant to reflect God—who he is and what he's like.
 - Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, that person is a new creation. The old has gone, the new is here! | 2 Corinthians 5:17
 - We were designed by a loving Father to reflect the beauty of who he is and live with him forever.
